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Food trucks get permanent parking

A GROWING NUMBER of the city's food trucks have become so successful that their proprietors are taking their talents indoors—that is, they are opening eateries. Schnitzel & Things, which sells the cutlets for \$8 to \$10, will make its brick-and-mortar debut on Third Avenue between East 45th and East 46th streets in March.

“Our truck couldn't keep up with the demand,” said co-owner **Hannah Voss**, who started the business with her husband, **Oleg Voss**, a former financial analyst.

When the restaurant opens, the couple will give up their commercial kitchen in Red Hook, Brooklyn. They will use their sparkling new kitchen to supply the truck, which will keep on truckin'.

Schnitzel follows the path of the popular CupcakeStop truck, which opened up shop at 70 Greenwich St. last month. Owner **Lev Ekster** secured his first major investor, **Richard Kallman**, whose family owns a wholesale book distributor, Bookazine.

More truckers turned restaurateurs are in the pipeline. Among them are Souvlaki GR, opening at 116 Stanton St. in the coming weeks, and the Treats Truck, opening at 521 Court St. in Brooklyn this summer. Some are partnering with each other. The new Schnitzel & Things eatery, for example, will offer desserts from Treats Truck owner **Kim Ima**.
